Digital Detox

As I hope a good number of parents will already know, through this term we are presenting students with a 'digital detox challenge' that focuses attention on smart phone and social media usage. The program begins, perhaps ironically, with the downloading of an app (Moment or BreakFree) that records phone usage to raise awareness and moves on to challenges such as not accessing social media for 24 hours, only using full words and grammatically correct sentences without emojis, only using the phone when alone, putting it down when relaxing and only using it for calls.

This is, of course, a response to the array of research that exposes the impact of overuse of smart phones on mental health, social relationships and general wellbeing. Awareness is the beginning of this and the challenges of the five weeks of our program are designed to highlight that. I hope that parents will take the opportunity to discuss the digital detox challenge with their children and encourage them to take it on.

Term 1/2 vacation rail and coach bookings



Absque Deo Nihil 1 Corinthians 13

When I was at uni, I was travelling to my lectures and needed petrol. I was at uni so the needle must have indicated 'empty' for about a week. So I stopped, filled up and went to pay. However, my card didn't work – not that unusual for a uni student, but that's alright – I assured the sales assistant that I would drop in on my way home to pay – and I offered my watch as securit. I thought it was a pretty nice watch, but he said, "have you got anything else?" I did, but just a text book floating around the back of my car with little prospect of being read at all, let alone on that particular day. So I offered him that – he took it, weird! In this guy's economy texts books are valued more highly than watches. If we examine the economy of the Kingdom of God, we see that love is valued more highly than what makes you impressive on other grounds.

Highland Science and **Engineering Challenge at UNE**

On Wednesday 7 March, TAS competed in the Regional division of the Science and Engineering Challenge held at University of New England. Thirty two students from Year 10 participated in eight activities throughout the day and points from each individual activity were accumulated to give a total score at the end of the day.

Activities students participated in were: bridge building, communications using optic fibre, public transport design tasks, electricity grid tasks, flat pack table and chair designs, water turbine designs as well as building earthquake resistant buildings.

Eight schools from across the region participated in the Challenge including TAS, NEGS, PLC, Duval/Armidale High, Guyra, Uralla, O'Connor and MET.

TAS has had quite a successful history in the event winning six out of the past eight years. Depending on the results from other regional challenges, TAS may get a chance to compete in the State Super Challenge in Newcastle later in the year. This day was a busy day for students and could only be possible with the assistance from the Armidale Rotary Clubs and their volunteers, the University of Newcastle for running the event and the University of New England for hosting and staffing the different activities over the day.

HSC In the Holidays


HSC In the Holidays is a holiday tutorial program that has been offering their services for a number of years and are quite prodigious in the courses that they offer.

Program

Please find on the following pages both the 'Pre Days' and 'Main Day' Programs for the Athletics Carnival. All events are held on Wakefield except for the Cloisters Run which is held in the main quadrangle.

Overview:

Tuesday 20 - Thursday 22 March (lunchtimes): High Jump and 800m (Students MUST attend the qualifying event for high jump to be eligible to compete in the final.)

Saturday 24 March: Cloisters Run, 8:30am, followed by events 9:00am-12:30pm Monday 26 March: 3000m and Catch Up events - 3:45pm.

Wednesday 28 March: Main Day: 8.45am – 4:30pm

Participation

The TAS Athletics Championships is a mass-participation 'event'. All students are strongly encouraged to participate in all events on all days. Attendance is compulsory on 24 and 28 March. Participation in the 100m (where a roll will be taken) and two field events is the minimum expected on the main day.

U/14 and U/16 Cricketers who are involved in Grand-Finals on Saturday 24 March should prioritise cricket and may attend catch up events on Monday 26 March, after school.

Age groups are based on how old a student turns this year eg. a student turning 15 this year is in the 15yrs age group.

Team selections

These Championships will be used as a guide to select our athletics teams for the GPS, NCIS and PSSA carnivals.

Dress

Students are to wear their House polo shirt, or House athletics singlet, and navy TAS shorts to all events. If socks are worn they must be white. If tracksuits are needed they must be TAS tracksuits. When not competing students should wear a TAS cap.

BBQ lunch

On 28 March, lunch will be provided for all students (including day students) and their parents from 12:00pm at Wakefield.

AAGPS Head of the River

Last Saturday, TAS crews competed in the First, Second and Third Fours at the AAGPS Head of the River. This is the pinnacle of schoolboy rowing in NSW and a wonderful test for our relatively inexperienced crews. All three crews have been training and preparing for months leading into this regatta and went into the race with high aspirations.

Against some very tough competition our First Four placed fifth and both the Second and Third Fours placed seventh. Racing on the Olympic course before a crowd over ten thousand people is a special experience. The fact that these crews were racing adds to the competition and the attraction of the event.




