This will be an opportunity to both look ahead and to reflect on what has been a big year for the P&F. TAS@Dusk, the biennial TAS Art Show, welcomes to new families, dinners and catering for a raft of school events have been achieved through considerable commitment right through 2018 and tonight will allow us to offer thanks to the many who have been a part of that. In particular, it will be the chance to offer thanks to the P&F Executive who have led that process and been behind the funding decisions that have benefitted all our students and I look forward to celebrating them and their work.

Douglas Shield Cricket

The cricket season for our First XI continues apace as we approach the end of the school year and they have been enjoying some very promising success. Beyond the Armidale grade competition where they have enjoyed wins over Guyra, Hillgrove and City, they have been playing in the Douglas Shield schools competition. The Douglas Shield is a 50 over knockout competition that attracts teams up to Year 11, our current senior year, from across country NSW. The early rounds are played between schools in reasonable proximity and thus far TAS has had good wins over Carinya Christian School in Tamworth and St Paul's Grammar School in Western Sydney, both played at TAS. Today TAS will play at home for a third consecutive time, this time in the quarter final against St Philip's Christian College from Cessnock. I offer thanks to the players and coaches from St Philip's who travelled up yesterday to stay with us overnight and I wish both teams well for a good game.

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Public Speaking and Performance at TAS

The end of the year brings public speaking and performance to the fore and a good number of our students from right across the School will be involved. After success a fortnight ago in the Lions Youth of the Year competition where Will Forsyth and Henry O'Neil represented TAS with Will's moving speech on the importance of community taking him on to the next level of the competition, our Middle School debaters will have their chance to shine today in the Tri-Schools debating competition and I wish all our speakers well for it. Other students will be preparing to entertain on the stage in different ways as Junior School rehearses for their production of the classic Alice in Wonderland next week and I know students and parents alike are looking forward to that. Middle and Senior School students will move into intensive rehearsals for the annual Inter-House Cash Cup Creative Arts competition when they return from Activities Week and parents will again be welcome to join us for the performances which begin at 1:30pm on Tuesday 11 December in the Memorial Hall.

Activities Week

This week students across Middle and Senior Schools are preparing for the coming Activities Week, with meetings yesterday to discuss arrangements and final gear issue and logistics being put in place. As I wrote last week, this coming week is the culmination of the program for the year and something that we invest in heavily. Almost all our teaching staff and a good number of our support staff will be in the field with our students and that reflects their collective belief in its importance as the centrepiece of our character development curriculum. Every Old Armidalian I know, through generations, has memories of their experiences in the Activities Program and of Activities Week in particular and I have never heard a past student say that they regretted their participation. Even those who admit that they did not delight in the prospect at the time, and there will still be some now, can readily see the personal benefits that the program gave them. This is because it is through experiences of stepping away from our comfort zone that we are able to test our boundaries and find character traits that perhaps we did not know we had. This is the central reason for our program and why we commit to it so heavily, rather than taking an easier path. It is an experience that is central to being a TAS student and I am looking forward to sharing it with our students in the bush and at the beach next week.



Annual Camp will be conducted over the period 1-7 Dec at Nymboida. Q Store & Advance Party will depart Fri 30 Nov. Signals Platoon & B Coy will depart on 1 Dec, A & C Coys on Sunday 2 Dec.

Attendance

3. Bivouac and Camp are an essential component of the school's outdoor activity program and curriculum. As such, all students are required to attend and participate.

Organisation

- 4. Cadets will work in platoon groups of up to thirty, guided by their leaders and supervised by members of staff and Nymboida Canoe Centre guides.
- 5. Cadets will camp in pairs in military style hootchies with their platoon, and amenities blocks will facilitate showering and washing at Camp HQ Nymboida Canoe Centre.
- 6. Most meals will be prepared and consumed in platoons, with some meals cooked and served centrally at the Canoe Centre with rations drawn from a mixture of fresh food, canned food and ration packs.



- N.B. 1 Pocket knifes are not to be taken or carried by cadets. Only leaders can bring their own small folding pocket knife.

 2. An additional set of DPCU/greens will be available at camp on a one for one basis.

 - 3. Shoes are mandatory for water activities Dunlop Volleys (or similar) should be purchased.



What not to Take

- 8. Cadets are **not to bring** the following:
 - **Aerosol Cans**
 - Mobile Phones
 - Matches/Lighters (except leaders)
 - Other Electronic items (i.e lpods, laptop, video games, etc)
 - Anything valuable
 - Lollies or soft drink

Medical

- 9. First Aid kits will be carried by each section and staff will have access to more sophisticated medical kits. Serious cases of injury or illness will be evacuated to Armidale (bivouac) or Grafton (camp).
- 10. Sister Murray will be attending Annual Camp this year and will provide the valuable medical support that she has in past years. Please be sure to notify Sister Murray of any medical problems or medications that are not already known to the School.

Other

- 11. **Discipline:** Normal School discipline applies, particularly with respect to contraband and behaviour.
- 12. **Haircut:** Students are to ensure they parade with appropriate length hair, Boys hair should be above the collar and ears, and cropped on top and their fringe. Girls must have their hair tied back and away from the face. This will significantly aid hygiene in the field. Please note, this is a requirement of the Australian Army Cadets and is a school expectation.
- 13. **Laundry at Annual Camp:** Laundry tubs are available at Camp. Cadets are expected to wash their own clothing where necessary.
- 14. **Weather:** November & December is usually hot and humid. Cadets must be prepared for this and carry an adequate supply of sun cream and insect repellent. Spring thunderstorms are also prevalent and cadets should bring an army style rain coat or can purchase a rain jacket from the TAS Clothing Store.

Meals and Water

- 15. All cadets must carry 2 L of town or purified water and maintain a high daily fluid intake.
- 16. Food will be supplied via School catering and commercially purchased cadet ration packs. Please note:

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) is unable to provide a severe food allergy free environment (such as from peanuts) in relation to the consumption of food during cadet activities. Such a risk may be life threatening for people who suffer from a severe food allergy. Parents may consider it is in their child's best interest not to allow participation of their child in the proposed activity. In the event that the child is allowed to attend a catered cadet activity, the parents may choose to provide, at their own expense, sufficient food to cover the duration of the activity.

Conclusion

17. This document is designed to give parents and students early warning, in order to provide time for planning and preparation for both Bivouac and Annual Camp. Further details will be issued to cadets during briefings prior to each event, and any enquiries should be directed to CO Cadets Major (AAC) Angus Murray or the Quartermaster Sergeant Simon Ball.



"But alas your memories must cloud"


